Andrea Auf der Heyde of Bloomington, Indiana, initiated the Teacher on the Trail Program in 1998. She created the program because of the focus her school placed on skills like perseverance, effort, organization, patience, initiative, sense of humor, cooperation, flexibility, problem-solving, curiosity, common sense, courage and caring.

### Qualifying for the Iditarod Teacher on the Trail is no easy task. Here are a few requirements:

A teacher must be actively teaching with 5 years previous experience. You and your school authorities must be able to handle a publicity attack organized by an animal rights group. Teacher on the Trail must be able to fly in small airplanes over the vast Alaska Wilderness. You must develop lesson plans for several grade levels for use on the Iditarod Website. You must demonstrate good citizenship, morally acceptable behavior and be recognized as a good role model promoting a healthy lifestyle.

If you are one of the top 3 finalists, after the application process, you will fly yourself to Alaska for a private personal interview with the Teacher on the Trail Committee. These 3 finalists are tested for skills of observation, creative writing and technology. They, also, will make a presentation at the summer teacher's conference in Alaska regarding their use of the Iditarod in their classroom. The Iditarod Teacher on the Trail must be physically fit, make public appearances throughout the year representing the Iditarod and attend the Iditarod Sled Dog Race.
