

Lead Dog or Leader Dog who runs in front of the others. Must be both intelligent and fast. Two lead dogs who lead the team side by side. **Double Leader** Dog that runs directly behind the leader. **Swing Dog** Wheel Dogs Dogs who are placed directly in front of the sled. Any dog other than a leader, or swing dog. **Team Dog** Mush! Hike! Lets Go! Commands to start the team. Command for a right turn. Gee! Haw! Command for a left turn. **Come Gee! Come Haw!** Commands for 180 degree turns. Command used to halt the team, accompanied by heavy pressure. Whoa! Command to lead dog to pull the team out straight from the sled. Line Out! Main rope that runs forward from sled. Tow line, Gang line Line that connects dog's collar to tow line. **Neck Line Snub Line** Rope attached to the sled which is used to tie the sled to an object. Long chain with shorter pieces attached to it; used to stake out dogs. **Tether Line** Line that connects dog's harness to tow line. **Tug Line** Toggles Small pieces of ivory or wood used by Eskimos to fasten tug lines to harnesses. Trail! Request for right-of-way on the trail. Metal or wooden post driven into the ground to which a dog is tied. Stake **Snow Hook, Anchor** Heavy piece of metal attached to sled by a line. Holds team for a short time. Injured, generally temporarily. Applies to both musher and dogs. Stove Up Dog in Basket Tired or injured dog carried in the sled. Collection of lines to which dogs are attached. Rigging The two bottom pieces of the sled which come in contact with the snow. **Runners** Thin strips of wood which make up the bottom of the sled basket. Slats Any northern type dog. Husky Original Alaska Breed, AKC recognized. They are big, & strong, but slow. Malamute Pushing the sled with one foot while the other remains on the runner. Pedaling **Indian Dog** An Alaska Husky that comes from an Indian Village. Medium sized northern breed dog (AKC). They usually have blue eyes. Siberian Husky

**Note:** Since dogs are not driven with reins, but by spoken orders, the leader of the team must understand all that is said to him and guide the others accordingly.
